Early Learning

ADVENTURES BEGIN BEFORE KINDERGARTEN

As we implemented our new strategic plan, we focused on what we do best – connecting with families in ways that matter. Our collaboration with Community Action Council of Howard County’s Head Start exemplifies this commitment. Teachers report that library-led classes spark curiosity, nurture a love of reading, and help children feel prepared for kindergarten.

One educator shared:
“This partnership stresses the importance of literacy and takes students on adventures with every visit.”

Library instructors visited Head Start classrooms **81 times, leading 202 classes**, and sharing hundreds of books with students and educators.

Beyond our walls, Library on the Go! brought learning directly to families. The team brings books, activities, and joy to neighborhoods where families

face barriers to visiting a branch. Families received free books and activity kits, and 97 percent of borrowed items were children’s materials.

One parent described how her son, who has sensory challenges, was able to explore books without feeling rushed – a reminder of why this work matters.

Our mobile library also serves multilingual families. One out of every 20 items borrowed from the van was from the children’s world language collection – compared to fewer than one in 100 items in branches.



Teen Empowerment

BELONGING, CONFIDENCE, AND CREATIVITY

Teens took center stage in our **2025 Summer Reading program**, and their enthusiasm told a powerful story.

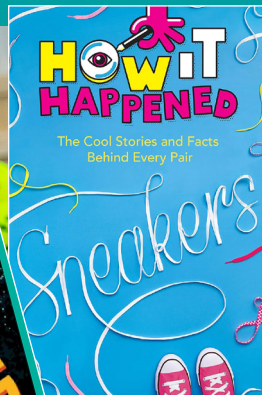
This program isn't just about books; it's about belonging. When teens feel connected, they discover agency and confidence – key priorities in our new strategic plan. We saw that connection in countless moments.

One parent shared that her son never reads. After hearing about Summer Reading Adventures at his middle school, he rushed to get a copy of two books, *How It Happened: Sneakers* and *Wrecker*.

His mom looked close to tears as she said, "I don't know what the librarian said, but thank you!"

Stories like this one reflect a bigger trend as completions rose **22 percent**, which includes **843 middle school students** in Howard County Public School System's Academic Intervention Summer School.



Bauder Book Talk
with Jason Reynolds



The Bauder Book Talk is our most anticipated teen event. In November, we welcomed author Jason Reynolds for an unforgettable conversation with 460 middle school students.

It was more than an event; it was a moment of inspiration.



Teen engagement doesn't stop when summer ends. Teens lead classes, join book clubs, and show up for events like Teen Live and the Bauder Book Talk.

Through our Teens Teach initiative, local youth step into leadership roles as they plan and teach classes on everything from Conscious Closet to Mindfulness Painting to Debate Academy. In FY25, **teens facilitated 17 sessions with 573 attendees**, including a debate series that ended in a spirited competition with 75 participants.

Book clubs at Howard and Long Reach High Schools give teens a chance to connect even if they can't make it to a branch. **Six sessions at Howard averaged 32 attendees**, and the sessions at Long Reach led to their students participating in the Bauder Book Talk for the first time.



At Teen Live, a celebration of creativity and connection, nearly 700 teens attended six events, diving into activities like 3D printing and the A/V Lab. We're planning to expand these STEAM experiences for 2026.

Community Connections

LEARNING WITHOUT LIMITS



Our commitment to community is about creating spaces where everyone feels welcome.

The Beyond Words initiative hosted many programs (**23 for adults, 15 for teens**), primarily at East Columbia and Miller branches. Attendance at Miller steadily grew from 10-12 people to more than 30 per session.

Language learning thrived as well. We offered **932 bilingual and world language classes, drawing 13,830 attendees**. Programs like Cuentos en Español and World Languages Café built bridges across cultures, where participants shared stories, food, and friendship.

Creativity flourished in our DIY & makerspace classes, where community members of all ages learned skills from sewing to 3D printing. The DIY collection circulated **more than 10,000 items**, empowering community members to tackle projects from gardening to home improvement.



HCLS also served as a vibrant gathering place for statewide trainings and events for Maryland public libraries – including the Emerging Adults Summit at Elkridge Branch, Library Associate Training Institute graduations at Miller Branch, and trainings around early childhood education and AI.

Our connection with veterans deepened as well. Through programs like the Veterans Book Group – held quarterly with steady participation – and *A Survivor's Story: The Attack on the USS Liberty*, veterans and community members found space to share, listen, and honor lived experiences.

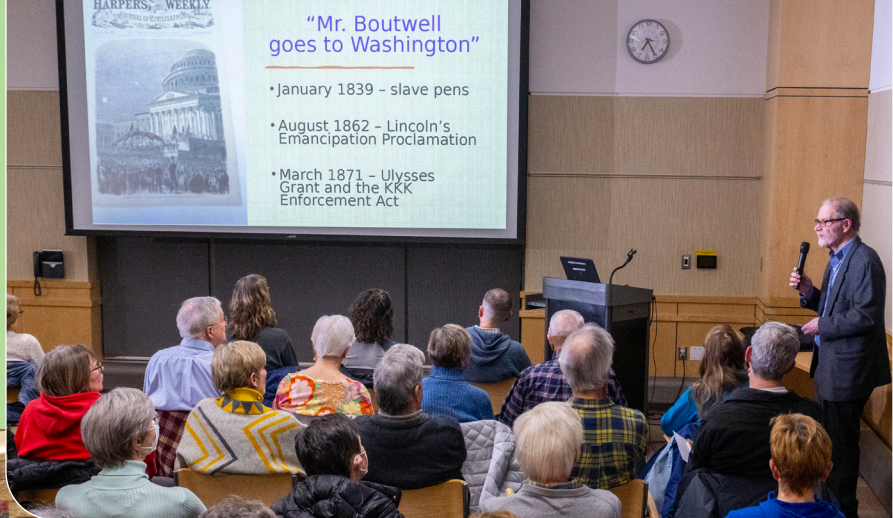

At Savage Branch, we hosted monthly visits with a social worker from the Baltimore VA Community Resource & Referral Center. Veterans can ask questions, seek support, and get information about the Center.

The refreshed Equity Resource Center serves as a welcoming hub for learning and reflection. Community members borrowed **16,896 items** from the Equity Resource Collection, exploring identities, histories, and perspectives.

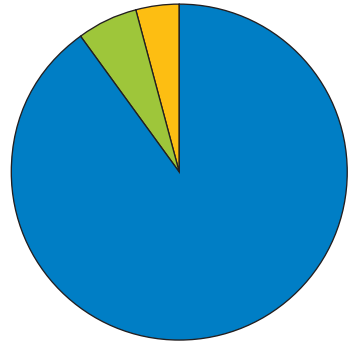

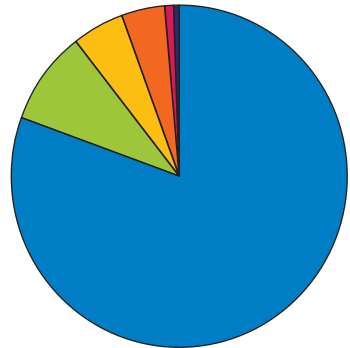
